



Developer hits recycle target

HERITAGE Pacific's two developments at Kallangur and Narangba have another string to add to their environmentally sustainable bows.

Figures show the company recovers up to 75 per cent of the waste generated from on-site housing construction.

The target set by Heritage Pacific was originally 70 per cent, however, the latest figures show an increase of 5 per cent.

The two projects involved in the recycling

program are Bridgeway, at Kallangur, and Forest Ridge, at Narangba.

Forest Ridge project manager Jeremy Bell said he was pleased with the results, with a strong emphasis on sustainability at each development.

"The materials we send away in skip bins from our sites include bricks and pavers, concrete, earth and soil, glass and plastic," he said.

"With this in mind, we have made a decision to increase our target to 90

per cent in the next 12 months.

"We have the ability to move remaining materials from one house over to the next house to minimise our wastage and this will further enhance the level of recycling we achieve, compared to traditional builders."

He said Heritage Pacific was one of the first developers in Queensland to embrace sustainability principles.
